There are many ways to get to Stachek Square. Some people take the train.




The Square is very busy. Keep an eye on traffic!

On the top of the Narva Triumphal Arch is a statue of the winged goddess Nike. She is in a chariot being pulled by six horses.



There are many statues on the Narva Arch. These two are ancient Russian warriors holding wreathes.





This beautiful statue is of the Roman Goddess Fame holding a laurel wreath. It is on the spandrel of the Arch.



There are other things to see in Stachek Square. This is the Monument to Leonid Govorov.



Make sure you stay with your group when you go to look at the statue!

At night they light the Arch with flood lights. Some people like to visit at night. I wonder what time you will visit?
