This is the main entrance. There are rules to follow once you go through this gate!




The rules here are very simple. They want you to walk, use a quiet voice and to stay on the walkways!

Just inside the gate is a basket with a plant guide. It will tell you all about the unusual plants you will see. There are also maps of the garden if you want to use one!




The garden is made up of small walled gardens and buildings. Each garden has different rocks, plants and features.

Here is one of the buildings in the garden. Notice the roof and the dragon up at the top!




The inside of the buildings have many antiques and works of art. The guide is reminding students not to touch!
